Funding Your Research Part C: Preparing a K99/R00 Award Application

The K99/R00 grant, also called the Pathway to Independence Award, provides funding for the last 1-2 years of your postdoctoral research training, followed by transitional funding for up to 3 years once you obtain an independent research position. Pre-registration required. Part of PASS.
